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This is how it looks after the chipping was complete on all of the surfaces. Reference photos helped me to make the chipping in a natural manner. I decided to add a different color to the doors in order to break up the base color of the body. Now it has an attractive appearance to continue with the weathering.

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This wagon has very nice surface details which can be highlighted with pin wash. I applied Dark Brown Wash (A.MIG-1005) with a fine round brush around the details then let it dry for an hour.



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Dark Wash (A.MIG-1008) was used on the surfaces painted with grey color.

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On the wood floor I first used Brown Wash (A.MIG-1000) then in some places Slimy Grime Dark and Light (A.MIG-1410 and 1411) was applied locally to get a more interesting look.



Sometimes accidents happen during the goods transferring in or out of the wagons... And it makes modelers very happy to reproduce these effects. Here some whitewash spilled out. First White oil was applied from Oilbrusher A.MIG-3501 then...

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...this white oil was blended with enamel thinner to achieve a realistic look. If this oil paint is blended to a thin layer it dries very fast, drying completely in a couple of hours. Although if the layer is thicker it takes a bit more time but it dries very fast in general when compared to other oil paints.

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
